# Quick & Simple Granny Shawl

## **NOT YOUR AVERAGE CROCHET**





## DIFFICULTY:

Easy/beginner

## SIZE:

56" (142 cm) wingspan before blocking, 68" (173 cm) wingspan after blocking (but adjustable to your liking by just adding or subtracting rows)



### **MATERIALS**:

- 6 skeins of Lion Brand Landscapes (New Aran) in colorway 204 Desert Spring (pictured above) or 882 yards (807 m) of an aran weight yarn of your choice
- 6.0 mm/US J hook
- Finishing items: scissors, tapestry needle, blocking pins & mats

### **GAUGE:**

Gauge is not important, just crochet until the shawl is the size you want!

### NOTES:

- Blocking is not required, it is up to your personal preference
- · Keep in mind that adjusting the size will also change the required amount of yarn
- The other pictured example below uses a DK weight yarn, King Cole Riot, with the 6.0 mm/ US J hook for a lacier feel; this is a great example of how you can customize the pattern to your liking!

#### PATTERN:

Using US terms (UK version is below)

#### SETUP:

With aran weight yarn & USJ (6.00 mm) hook, ch5, ss to join & form a ring (or use magic loop method, whichever you prefer).

ROW 1: ch 4, dc 3 in ring, ch 3, dc 3 more in ring, ch 1, dc.

**ROW 2:** ch 4, dc 3 in ch 1 sp, dc 3 in ch 3 sp, ch 3, dc 3 again in ch 3 sp, dc 3 in next ch sp, ch 1, dc in third ch from the end of previous row.

**ROW 3:** ch 4, dc 3 in ch 1 sp, dc 3 in each sp between clusters of the row below until you get to the ch 3 sp; in the ch 3 sp of the row below, dc 3, ch 3, dc 3; continue making 3 dc in each sp between clusters to the end, dc 3 in next ch sp, ch 1, dc in third ch from end of previous row.

Repeat row 3 until shawl is the size you want (I repeated row 3 41 more times for my shawl).

#### FINISHING:

Mine was worked until the wingspan was 56" (about 142 cm) then blocked to 68" (about 172 cm). I could have blocked it further but I wanted to preserve the fluffy sort of dense character. This shawl would be cute with added tassels or pom-poms on the corners or a cute border — feel free to add whatever strikes your fancy!

Using UK terms:

#### **SETUP & FINISHING** are the same.

**ROW 1:** ch 4, tr 3 in ring, ch 3, tr 3 more in ring, ch 1, tr.

**ROW 2:** ch 4, tr 3 in ch 1 sp, tr 3 in ch 3 sp, ch 3, tr 3 again in ch 3 sp, tr 3 in next ch sp, ch 1, tr in third ch from the end of previous row.

**ROW 3:** ch 4, tr 3 in ch 1 sp, tr 3 in each sp between clusters of the row below until you get to the ch 3 sp; in the ch 3 sp of the row below, tr 3, ch 3, tr 3; continue making 3 tr in each sp between clusters to the end, tr 3 in next ch sp, ch 1, tr in third ch from end of previous row. Repeat row 3 until shawl is the size you want (I repeated row 3 41 more times for my shawl).

Finish as instructed above and you're done!
